Kiwanis' Service Leadership Programs are unique. While other groups offer a service or leadership program for one specific age group, Kiwanis offers programs for all ages. Members learn leadership skills, participate in service projects and develop healthy personal relationships. Our programs use social and emotional learning techniques that are proven to help children and adults deal with adversity, focus, work well with others and become effective communicators and problem-solvers.



Kiwanis-sponsored, member-led

Kiwanis is a global organization of volunteers dedicated to improving the world one child and one community at a time. Each year the Kiwanis family dedicates more than 18.5 million hours to service and raises more than US\$100 million for local and global causes. Through local and global service projects, we strive to create a lifelong commitment of caring in people of all ages and abilities.

Our Service Leadership Programs are sponsored by local Kiwanis clubs or approved community organizations, giving members access to service-minded adults in their communities. Numerous mentoring studies have demonstrated the positive effects of having caring adults — beyond parents — as role models.

Our programs are member-led. Adult advisors mentor and guide. Members select their leaders, plan their agendas, choose their service projects, decide when their clubs will meet and make most of the major decisions for their clubs.

Responsibilities

Advice Appoint and train a Kiwanis advisor who will attend every meeting and event, mentor the club and serve as a liaison between the SLP and the Kiwanis club.

Fiscal duties Maintain an expense line item in the Kiwanis club's service account to support the SLP club's activities and ensure all dues and fees are paid on time.

Liaison Meet with the school principal or organization manager to coordinate club oversight and discuss goals and expectations.

Skills development Ensure club officers receive proper training following elections and help all SLP club members access opportunities for training and growth beyond the club level.

Kiwanis family experiences Hold a planning session involving Kiwanis club leadership and SLP club officers. Host or participate in joint activities involving the membership of the Kiwanis and SLP club. Invite SLP club members to attend sponsoring Kiwanis club meetings.
